## Proposed change in title and course description

#### FROM:

## THA 6000 – INTRODUCTION TO COSTUME AND MAKEUP (3 crs. 3 hrs.)

Fundamentals of visual design theory and aesthetics for theatrical costume will be learned through theoretical as well as experimental application. Students will learn the common practices of the design process through sketches, collages, and rendering techniques. Students will also be introduced to the basic sewing techniques necessary for the current entertainment industry.

## THA 6000- INRODUCTION TO COSTUMING AND MAKEUP (3 crs. 3 hrs.)

Through this course, students will learn the fundamentals of theatrical costuming and make-up for the stage. Students will gain skills in wardrobe supervision, costume management, wardrobe organization, alterations & repairs, make-up application, as well as basic sewing techniques necessary for the current entertainment industry. Students will learn the basic principles of costume design, as well as how to examine renderings and drawings for information regarding costume construction and make-up application.

THA 60: Introduction to Costuming and Makeup, as a course in

Kingsborough's A.S. Theatre Arts, fulfills a requirement in the Theatre Production Concentration. The ability to successfully understand and execute the basics of costuming, wardrobe management and makeup application is essential for any individual seeking a career in the entertainment industry. By learning the basics of theatrical costuming, wardrobe supervision and makeup, the student will enhance his/her problem solving, visual, and verbal communication skills.
