RE: Course Description, Prerequisite, and Corequisite for SAC 3200 – Addiction and the Family

The Department of Allied Health, Mental Health and Human Services is proposing a change in Course Description, Prerequisite, and Corequisite for SAC 3200 – Addiction and the Family

Course Description:

FROM:

This course explores the variety of familial issues that arise in families faced with a member who is struggling with a substance use disorder. Basic family functions/roles and how these are impacted by addiction are discussed. Theories on the family/how these can be applied to understanding family addiction (including systems, addicted family model, psychodynamic, functionalist, feminist) are included. Stages of family use and how these impact communication patterns and the adaptive family roles and their relationship with development of an ACOA syndrome are covered.

TO:

This course provides students with instruction in the interpersonal and behavioral dynamics of addiction in the family. Students are introduced to a variety of family theories and models that can be used in assessment and treatment. The bio-psycho-social-environmental effects of addiction on the family are examined. Critical elements in screening, assessment, treatment/discharge and relapse prevention planning, crisis intervention and case management are reviewed and students practice basic skills needed to work with families as individuals and in family groups. Students are introduced to prevalent evidence—based approaches and emphasis is placed on cultural factors and on special issues including that related to military families, co-occurring disorders, domestic violence and others. Practice in delivering addiction materials as psycho-educational interventions to families is also addressed.

Rationale for Changes:

The NYS Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS), formerly the NYS Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services "oversees and establishes guidelines for the comprehensive statewide education and training of New York State's credentialed addiction professional workforce and all staff who provide treatment, prevention and recovery services." In Fall 2018, OASAS mandated that all educational institutions who offer the 350-hours of education and training leading to the Credentialed Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counselor Certification (CASAC) must offer a standardized curriculum. The changes in course description align with OASAS requirements in order to meet the Certification in Alcohol and Substance Abuse Counseling – Trainee (CASAC-T) credential.

Having **both** SAC 2000 – Introduction to Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counseling and SAC 2200 - Counseling Techniques in the Substance Abuse Field I, as prerequisites allows for proper course sequencing in the program and ensures that students have a solid grasp of information and materials covered in the introductory courses.

This course can be taken any time during the program after the prerequisites of SAC 2000 and SAC 2200 have been met.
