# HIS 6500 - Social Unrest and Revolution in Modern Times

The ideological basis of industrialism, laissez-faire, doctrines of reform and transformation, the co-related movements in the 19th and 20th centuries. Topics include: emergence of post-democratic totalitarianism in Russia, Italy, and Germany, contemporary expressions of Socialism, Marxism, Leninism, and revisionist views of liberalism and democracy.

## **Introduction to Modern Ideologies**

Revolutions and vast social movements characterized the 20<sup>th</sup> century. These events involved a great conflict of ideologies or points of views about capitalism, individuality and the power of the state. We examine the central ideologies of fascism, Marxism, communism and liberalism. In doing so, we look at the history of important historical figures such as Lenin, Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin.

# **Rationale for Change:**

The title is unclear as to subject matter ad the description refereed topics both unknown to students and unclear to the faculty. The new title makes clear the introductory nature of the course and links more common ideas to some historical figures students in which the students might be interested.
