Re: Creation of Two Concentrations within the Criminal Justice Major

#### **Introduction:**

A number of changes in the political and economic landscape within which our Criminal Justice Program operates have occurred over the past 15 years. The CRJ field has expanded into related areas such as restorative justice, re-entry, and advocacy. These changes in the field have stimulated changes in the degree opportunities now available at our primary transfer institution, John Jay College of Criminal Justice, with whom we have a registered dual enrollment program.

The current Criminal Justice Major has a primary focus on preparing students for careers and continued study in all aspects of Law Enforcement. This portion of the program will continue to be a central part of the program and will now be organized as the Law Enforcement Studies Concentration.

The Law, Society and Justice Concentration will share a common core of 5 required courses and 4 additional courses. Of this second set of four, two will include the new Introduction to Law and Society (SOC 6500) approved in 2022 and a proposed new course, Introduction to Criminology (SOC 4200). For the remaining two required courses students will be able to choose from five courses including CRJ 6700, PHI 6600, CRJ 7500, SOC 3300 & CRJ 6400 as described below. It will be recommended that students take one or more of the remaining choices above as electives.

This new concentration will also prepare students for the Criminal Justice BS major at John Jay, as well as other programs within John Jay that students might choose to pursue.

#### **Current Program Description 2024-2025 College Catalog:**

The Criminal Justice AA degree is a jointly registered dual enrollment degree program with John Jay College of Criminal Justice and prepares students for transfer to their baccalaureate program. Courses provide foundational knowledge on the historical development, functions, and roles of the criminal justice system, critical examination of criminological theories and their application, and critical analysis of the social response to crime and the practice of criminal justice.

#### **Proposed Program Description anticipated 2026-2027 College Catalog:**

The Criminal Justice AA degree is a jointly registered dual enrollment degree program with John Jay College of Criminal Justice and prepares students for transfer to their baccalaureate program.

Students may choose between two concentrations within the Major; Law Enforcement Studies and Law, Justice and Society. Both concentrations provide students with foundational knowledge on the historical development, functions, and roles of the criminal justice system, critical examination of criminological theories and their application, and critical analysis of the social response to crime and the practice of criminal justice.

The Law Enforcement Studies Concentration is designed for students whose primary interest is the pursuit of a career in the field of law enforcement. All of the required courses in this concentration transfer directly to the BS degree programs at John Jay as well as prepare students to take the entrance exams for the full range of law enforcement professions.

The Law, Justice and Society Concentration is designed for students whose interests include advocacy, policy, and community-based work in justice-impacted communities as well as legal careers.

#### **Transfer/Articulation:**

Kingsborough Community College is a member of the John Jay Criminal Justice Academy, a dual enrollment program involving all of the CUNY community colleges. The proposed new structure involving two concentrations will continue to prepare students for entry into John Jay's Criminal Justice BS program. The courses will transfer as program electives. (See attached draft Articulation Agreement between KCC and John Jay).

# **Concentration Learning Outcomes and Assessment Plan:**

#### **Current Program Learning Outcomes:**

Upon successful completion of the Criminal Justice degree program requirements, graduates will:

- 1. understand the historical development, functions, and roles of each component of the criminal justice system.
- 2. describe and critically examine the major criminological theories on crime causation and prevention, and apply them to criminal justice practice.
- 3. critically analyze the social response to crime and the practice of criminal justice.
- 4. demonstrate the ability to access, conduct interpret, and apply criminal justice research.

These learning outcomes were developed with the John Jay Justice Academy and are consistent across all Academy programs. With the creation of two new concentrations we are taking outcome #2 above and making that the concentration learning outcome for the Law Enforcement Studies concentration and using a slightly modified version of #2 as the concentration learning outcome for the Law, Justice and Society concentration.

#### G. ARTICULATION AGREEMENT FOLLOW-UP PROCEDURE

1. Procedures for reviewing, updating, modifying or terminating agreement:

When either of the degree programs involved in this agreement undergoes a change, the agreement will be reviewed and revised accordingly by representatives from each institution's respective departments, selected by their chairpersons/program directors.

2. Procedures for evaluation agreement, i.e., tracking the number of students who transfer under the articulation agreement and their success:

Each semester John Jay will provide KCC with the following information: a) the number of KCC students who applied to the program; b) the number of KCC students who were accepted into the program; c) the number of KCC students who enrolled; and d) the aggregate GPA of these enrolled students.

3. Sending and receiving college procedures for publicizing agreement, e.g., college catalogs, transfer advisers, Websites, etc.:

This articulation agreement will be publicized on the KCC website, and on John Jay's website. Transfer advisors at KCC will promote this agreement with eligible students.


